REGENT SUKOHARJO,

Considering: that to implement the provisions of Article 83

Minister of Home Affairs Regulation Number 79 of 2018 concerning Regional Public Service Bodies, it is necessary to stipulate a Regent's Regulation concerning Service Tariffs At the Implementing Unit Regional Public Service Agency Regional Technical Center for Public Health;

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

article 1

In this Regent's Regulation what is meant by: 1. Region is Sukoharjo Regency.

- Regional Government is the Regent as the organizing element of Regional Government which leads the implementation of government affairs which are the authority of the autonomous region.
- 3. The Regent is the Regent of Sukoharjo.
- 4. Health Service is the Sukoharjo District Health Service.
- 5. Regional Technical Implementation Unit, hereinafter abbreviated to UPTD, is an organization that carries out operational technical activities and/or certain supporting technical activities at the Department.
- 6. Community Health Center, hereinafter referred to Puskesmas is a health service facility carry out public health efforts and first-level individual health efforts, by prioritizing promotive and preventive efforts, to achieve the highest level of public health in the working area.
- 7. UPTD Puskesmas is UPTD Puskesmas at Public health Office.
- 8. Regional Public Service Agency, hereinafter abbreviated to BLUD, is a system implemented by UPTD in providing services to the community that has flexibility in financial management patterns as an exception to regional management provisions in general.
- 9. The BLUD leader is the Head of the UPTD Puskesmas.
- 10. BLUD income is all BLUD revenues in a certain fiscal year period which are the BLUD's rights.
- 11. Puskesmas Health Services, hereinafter referred to as Health Services, are efforts provided by Puskesmas to the community, including planning, implementation, evaluation, recording and reporting as outlined in a system.
- 12. Outpatient services are services to patients for observation, diagnosis, treatment, medical rehabilitation and other health services without staying in the inpatient room.
- 13. Inpatient services are services to patients for observation, diagnosis, treatment, medical rehabilitation, and/or other health services by occupying a bed.
- 14. Emergency services are medical actions required by emergency patients immediately to save lives and prevent disability.

- 15. Medical action services are medical action services, both operative and non-operative.
- 16. Medical supporting services are services to support medical services, to help establish diagnosis and therapy.
- 17. Medical rehabilitation services are services provided to patients in the form of physiotherapy services, occupational therapy, speech therapy, orthotics/ prosthetics, medical social guidance and psychology and other rehabilitation services.
- 18. Integrated traditional health services are a form of health service that combines conventional health services with complementary traditional health services, either as a complement or a substitute in certain circumstances.
- 19. Consultation services are services in order to provide explanations regarding health including nutrition, infectious diseases, environmental health, maternal and child health, and others.
- 20. Home services or *home care* are continuous and comprehensive health services provided to individuals and families in their place of residence which aims to increase, maintain, maximize the level of independence and minimize the impact of disease.
- 21. Visum et repertum is a written report made by a doctor at the request of an investigator regarding the results medical examination of human bodies (both living and dead) for judicial purposes.
- 22. Ambulance service is the activity of transporting patients using a Puskesmas ambulance.
- 23. Educational services are services that are the result of collaboration in the form of health education practices related to health and health management.
- 24. Health education practices are all forms of services provided by medical personnel and other health personnel aimed at individuals or health education institutions or other institutions in the form of clinical and non-clinical practices.
- 25. Clinical practice is an activity provided by medical personnel and/or other health personnel in the form of clinical case guidance.
- 26. Non-clinical practice is a health education activity by medical personnel and/or other health personnel in the form of supervising non-clinical cases.
- 27. Research data collection services are activities provided by medical personnel and/or other health personnel in the context of providing information to researchers.
- 28. Comparative study services are activities provided by medical personnel and/or other health personnel in the context of providing information or provision including orientation according to the topic.

- 29. Service rates are all costs charged to the public for providing services at the BLUD UPTD Puskesmas.
- 30. The rate per week is the rate charged for types of clinical and non-clinic practice services which are calculated for 6 (six) working days, if less than 6 (six) working days are calculated the same as 6 (six) working days.
- 31. Service is the compensation received by the service provider for the services provided to patients in the context of observation, diagnosis, treatment, consultation, visitation, medical rehabilitation or other services.
- 32. Capitation is the amount of monthly payment paid in advance by BPJS Health to first level health facilities based on the number of registered participants without taking into account the type and amount of health services provided.
- 33. Non-capitation is the amount of claim payments by BPJS Health to first-level health facilities based on the number and type of health services provided.

CHAPTER II

PUSKESMAS BLUD UPTD SERVICES

Section 2

Service tariff objects at BLUD UPTD Puskesmas include:

a. Health services; and b.

Educational services.

Article 3

(1) Types of health services as referred to in Article 2 letter a, include: a. outpatient; b.

emergency

services; c. maternity services;

- d. home care (home care);
- e. inpatient; f. medical treatment

services; g.

medical support services; h.

other health services.

- (2) The types of outpatient services, both sick and healthy visits, as referred to in paragraph (1) letter a are general examinations, dental and mouth examinations, Integrated Management of Sick Toddlers (MTBS) examinations and Maternal Child Health Examinations Family Planning (KIA- family planning), including the provision of medicines, materials and basic health service equipment.
- (3) The type of emergency service as referred to in paragraph (1) letter b is an Emergency Unit (ER) examination.

(4) Types of delivery services as referred to in paragraph (1) letter c include: a. normal

delivery by a doctor; b. normal

delivery by a midwife; c. vaginal

delivery with basic emergency assistance at the Community Health Center; d. assisted

vaginal delivery

basic emergency measures;

e. childbirth with infectious diseases; f.

postnatal care services; g. handling post-

miscarriage bleeding; h. assistance for normal

newborns; i. assisting newborns with

basic emergency measures at the Basic Emergency Neonatal Obstetric Services (PONED) Community Health Center; j. assist newborns with basic

emergency measures; k. suture the perineal wound; and l. pre-referral

services for complications

obstetrics and newborns.

- (5) The type of home care service, as referred to in paragraph (1) letter d, is a service provided by:
 - a. Doctor;
 - b. Nurse;
 - c. Midwife.
- (6) Types of inpatient services, as referred to in paragraph (1) letter e include: room, dining patients, nutritional consultations, waiting, nursing/midwifery care, caring for babies with disorders and doctor visits, not including administering medicines, materials and basic health service equipment.
- (7) Types of medical services, as referred to in paragraph (1) letter f include: a. General medical procedures; b. Dental and oral health service measures.
- (8) Types of medical supporting health services as referred to in paragraph (1) letter g include: a.

Electrocardiogram (EKG) examination; b.

Ultra Sonography (USG) examination; c.

Body Mass Index (BMI) examination; d.

Spirometry examination; e.

Laboratory examination; f.

Radiological Examination; and

- g. Medical Rehabilitation.
- (9) Other types of health services, as intended in paragraph (1) letter h include: a. post mortem et repertum;

b. integrated traditional health services; c. ambulance service; d. hearse services; and e. health team services.

Article 4

Education services as referred to in Article 2 letter b, include: a. individual clinical practice; b. individual non-clinical practice; c. study; and D. comparative study services.

CHAPTER III

STRUCTURE AND AMOUNT OF SERVICE RATES Article 5

- (1) The structure and amount of service rates are classified based on the BLUD UPTD Puskesmas services.
- (2) The structure and amount of service tariffs consist of facilities and/or service components.
- (3) The structure and amount of health service rates at the BLUD UPTD Puskesmas, as stated in Appendix I which is an inseparable part of this Regent's Regulation.
- (4) The structure and amount of educational service rates in BLUD UPTD Puskesmas, as stated in Appendix II which is an inseparable part of this Regent's Regulation.

CHAPTER IV

PRINCIPLES AND OBJECTIVES IN DETERMINING STRUCTURE AND AMOUNT OF SERVICE RATES

Article 6

Determining the amount of service fees takes into account the

following

aspects: a. continuity; b. service

development; c. need;d. people's purchasing

power; e. principles of justice and propriety; and f. healthy competition.

CHAPTER V

HEALTH SERVICES FOR WARRANT PARTICIPANTS HEALTH AND LIABILITY OF THIRD PARTIES

Article 7

(1) Patients participating in health insurance or other third party dependents are provided with services in accordance with applicable regulations.

- (2) The amount of financing for health services for patients participating in health insurance or other third parties in accordance with the Cooperation Agreement made by the health insurance service provider or guarantor with the BLUD Leader.
- (3) All revenue obtained from health insurance service providers or other guarantors as intended in paragraphs (1) and (2) shall be managed in accordance with the financial management mechanism of the BLUD UPTD Puskesmas and statutory regulations.

CHAPTER VI

REVIEW OF SERVICE RATES

Article 8

- (1) Service Tariffs are reviewed no later than once every 3 (three) years.
- (2) Review of Service tariffs as intended in paragraph (1) is carried out by taking into account the Price Index and economic developments.
- (3) Changes and/or additions to service tariff types are determined by the Regent based on the recommendation of the Head of Service.

CHAPTER VII

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Article 9

Health service rates at BLUD UPTD Puskesmas are excluded for medicines and consumables, services facilities and services for program services.

CHAPTER VIII

CLOSING

Article 10

This Regent's Regulation comes into force on the date of promulgation.

So that everyone is aware, this Regent's Regulation is ordered to be promulgated by placing it in the Regional Gazette of Sukoharjo Regency.
